What those F1 - F12 Keys actually do ..

Look at your computer's keyboard and you'll notice the cluster of function keys labeled F1 to F12. These keys perform multiple actions when used within operating systems and browsers, so get ready for a crash course in the function keys. There are lots of hidden functions that save time and keystrokes!



Add on to your existing knowledge of Ctrl + Alt + Del and other mouse-free advanced tricks. With this list below, you'll be endowed with a set of shortcuts and easy fixes once you get the hang of them

Keep in mind that on many [laptop PCs](#), pressing the "Fn" on the keyboard will enable functions to use with F-keys on your computer such as those for multimedia. If those options are already enabled on your computer, you can deactivate them by going to the control panel.

Family History Microfilm Discontinuation

On September 1, 2017, FamilySearch will discontinue its microfilm distribution services. (The last day to order microfilm will be on August 31, 2017.)

The change is the result of significant progress made in FamilySearch's microfilm digitization efforts and the obsolescence of microfilm technology.

- Online access to digital images of records allows FamilySearch to reach many more people, faster and more efficiently.
- FamilySearch is a global leader in historic records preservation and access, with billions of the world's genealogical records in its collections.
- Over 1.5 million microfilms (ca. 1.5 billion images) have been digitized by FamilySearch, including the most requested collections based on microfilm loan records worldwide.
- The remaining microfilms should be digitized by the end of 2020, and all new records from its ongoing global efforts are already using digital camera equipment.
- Family history centers will continue to provide access to relevant technology, premium subscription services, and digital records, including restricted content not available at home.

Digital images of historical records can be accessed today in 3 places on FamilySearch.org under Search.

- Records include historical records indexed by name or organized with an image browse.
- Books include digital copies of books from the Family History Library and other libraries.
- Catalog includes a description of genealogical materials (including books, online materials, microfilm, microfiche, etc.) in the FamilySearch collection.

When approved by priesthood leaders, centers may continue to maintain microfilm collections already on loan from FamilySearch after microfilm ordering ends. Centers have the option to return microfilm that is available online or otherwise not needed. As more images are published online, centers may reevaluate whether to retain microfilm holdings.

WW1 Hospital Records Collection on Forces War Records has now Reached 1 Million

The following announcement was written by the people at Forces War Records in the UK:

These records have been painstakingly transcribed, directly from the original Military Hospital records in the National Archives, so you won't find these anywhere else online. The original documents were handwritten, often barely readable, but the Forces War Records UK based transcription team of 70+ experts worked for 2 years to decipher it and get the data online, making it easy for this collection to be searched, simply by name.

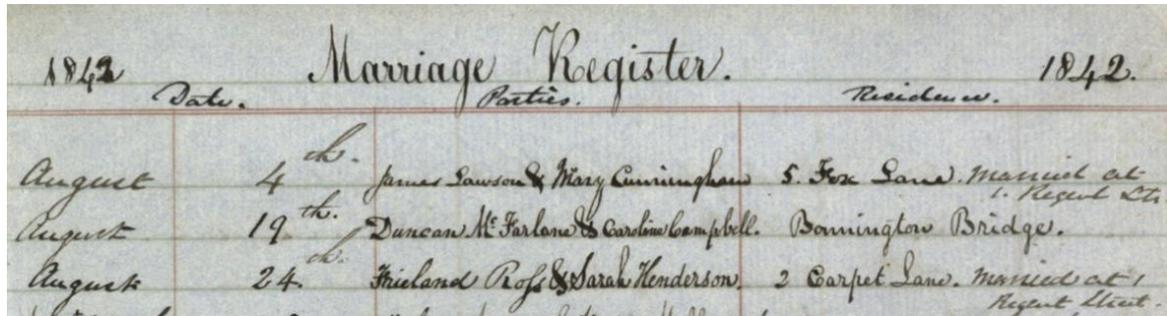

Release of Presbyterian Church Records

From 26 June 2017, more than 36,000 new Presbyterian church records, covering the period 1744 to 1855 have been added to ScotlandsPeople'. The 20,255 births and baptisms (1744-1855), 10,368 marriages and proclamations (1729-1855) and 5,422 death and burial records (1783-1855) may be especially helpful for anyone searching for a person born or baptised, married or died before the introduction of statutory registration in 1855. Further information about our [church registers](#) can be found in our record guide.

Old Parish Registers (OPRs), already available to search through the website, were compiled by ministers of the Church of Scotland, and therefore do not include surviving records of baptisms that were created in other presbyterian denominations that separated themselves from the established church and sometimes also formed further separate denominations.

Adelaide Observer (SA : 1843 - 1904), Saturday 29 December 1877, page 6

SALISBURY, December 28.

We have had delightful weather for our Christmas holidays, when our seaside resort, St. Kilda, was visited by some hundreds of health and pleasure seekers. On the parade there no less than four publicans' booths and five or six stalls for the sale of fruit and other refreshments.

The Bible Christians had also a bazaar in aid of the Elim Chapel, and secured a very considerable trade. During the afternoon the scene on the fine level sands was a very animated and cheerful one; excellent order and temper prevailed, with no other contretemps than the bogging of a few traps in 'the swamp upon the return journey.

Note: Elim Chapel used to be situated in the Waterloo Corner area, not evidence of either the chapel or cemetery remains today.
