If you know the address of the 1911 resident, The National Archives will offer a limited research service. They hope to offer a searchable online service in early 2009. The census in its entirety cannot be legally released until 2011.

## **Practical Genealogy for Family Historians**

Flinders University is again offering course in genealogy or family history which is available to the general public. It is offered as a series of modules or workshops, each of 6 hours. Students may take all four modules, or they may take only the modules of their choice. Those who successfully complete all four modules will be awarded a Certificate of Achievement issued by Flinders University.

Participants who successfully complete the full course may also be credited 6 units toward the new Flinders University Graduate Certificate in Applied History and Heritage Studies (which requires a total of 18 units), or toward the Flinders University Graduate Diploma in Applied History and Heritage Studies (36 units).

Practical Genealogy for Family Historians will be taught at the State Library of South Australia. The teacher for all four workshops is Graham Jaunay. All course materials will be made available to students. Limited places are available.

#### **Course structure:**

The course consists of the following modules or workshops, each of six hours:

- 1. Saturday March 31: Accessing the primary research stream—the family
- 2. Saturday April 14: Accessing the secondary research stream—the paper trail
- 3. Saturday April 28: Interpreting the Record
- 4. Saturday May 12: Climbing the genealogy barriers

#### Fees:

The cost of each workshop for those not completing the assessment is \$198 (GST inclusive). For those who take the full series of workshops, and who also undertake the assessment for the purpose of gaining a Certificate of Achievement, the cost is \$990 (GST inclusive).

# The Spain Family of Salisbury Maureen M. Leadbeater

My mother often spoke of her grandmother, although she had died before my mother was born. Her grandmother was always referred to as "Mary Spain", her maiden name, but there was little further information about her family – only that they came from Ireland on the ship "Trafalgar".

When I began my research 20 years ago, I already knew my mother's line back to Mary Spain, so I began with the Spain arrival. There in the newspaper of 1847 were Spain names listed for the "Trafalgar" but separated into three lists. The next problem was to prove my hunch that they were all one family, with them split for the voyage into family, single women and single men. My great-great-grandparents Patrick Spain and Mary nee Coughlin did arrive in South Australia in July 1847 with their eight children aged between 8 and 20 years. The parents had been married and the children baptised in a small church in the parish of Eglish in County Offaly, Ireland. Their life in Ireland is not known.

There are a few clues to their first years in the colony. Patrick's name appears on a certificate in support of a teacher at Salisbury in 1850 when he had two school-age children. In the same year he subscribed £1 (as did most of the others) towards a proposed church.

In 1852 "Patrick Spain, farmer, Little Para" leased land and the following year he purchased three sections of land. There are no family stories that Patrick and his sons went to the Victorian goldfields. However it seems likely that this was the source of the money for these purchases, almost £550. In the next years Patrick sold one block and passed another to his second son Martin, keeping the 80-acre Section 2232 for himself. From this in 1856 the government took two acres when the Adelaide-Gawler railway line was laid across the corner of the Spain land. The six acres across the line were sold to a neighbour.

Son Patrick married Mary Maguire in 1856 but within two months he returned from Mintaro to die of "inflammation of the brain". Patrick's is the earliest recorded burial in St Augustine's Catholic Cemetery at Salisbury. It is recorded in the register of St Patrick's, Adelaide.

A family crisis occurred in the mid-1860s. The eldest son Edward was killed by lightning in February 1864 while working on a farm near Rhynie. Then the father Patrick died sometime between 1864 and September 1866 when his widow Mary died – his death is not registered, nor is his burial recorded. Although Patrick left a will, the powers-that-be declared it invalid. Eventually Martin was acknowledged as Heir-at-Law and he was able to divide the land between the four youngest children according to his father's wishes, each receiving a little more than 17 acres. The three girls sold their land in 1869 and soon after John, now suffering with an injured leg, also sold his share to move to a cottage in John Street, Salisbury. Later he took his family to Bowden.

The eldest surviving brother Martin had married Bridget Maher in 1853. In 1877 he and his eldest son took up land in the Hundred of Telowie under the credit selection scheme. Anne married Peter Conley in 1855 and Catherine married James Ryan in 1867. Both families settled in the Lower Wakefield district. Mary married James Thompson in 1865, John married widow Catherine Barrett nee Doran in 1865 and Eliza married Patrick Peter Murphy in 1866. Both Mary and Eliza remained in the Salisbury district.

The only reminder of the Spain family in Salisbury is the naming of Spains Road. Patrick's Section 2232 was situated along this road, roughly north of the Spains Road Cemetery (now renamed Salisbury Memorial Park).
